'Least become most important'

Hebrews 12:5a. 6-7, 11 Psalm 119 Luke 13:22-30



How did Jesus show us the way to God's kingdom? The things that he said and did helped us to see the way that God wanted us to live. It is not easy to live this way. Can anyone belong to the kingdom of God? What must each of us do today and every day to please God and be ready when Jesus comes again?

### Leader's Preparation

In preparation for leading this celebration, begin by reading and reflecting on the Scriptures for the Twenty First Sunday in Ordinary Time, starting with the Gospel. (You may choose to use or focus on one reading only, but remember that the Gospel may not be omitted.) Then look through the preparatory material that follows and familiarise yourself with the Liturgy Outline.

GOSPEL Luke 13:22-30

As Jesus was on his way to Jerusalem, he taught the people in the towns and villages. Someone asked him, "Lord, are only a few people going to be saved?"

Jesus answered: "Do all you can to go in by the narrow door! A lot of people will try to get in, but will not be able to. Once the owner of the house gets up and locks the door, you will be left standing outside. You will knock on the door and say, 'Sir, open the door for us!'

"But the owner will answer, 'I don't know a thing about you!'

"Then you will start saying, 'We dined with you, and you taught in our streets.'

"But he will say, 'I really don't know who you are! Get away from me, all you evil people!"

"Then when you have been thrown outside, you will weep and grit your teeth because you will see Abraham and Isaac and all the prophets in God's kingdom. People will come from all directions and sit down to feast in God's kingdom. There the ones who are now least important will be the most important, and those who are now most important will be least important."

### Background to the Readings for Leaders

In the first reading, the community to whom the letter was addressed was evidently going through some suffering, for which sinful behaviour was apparently not the cause. Viewing suffering as a form of discipline or instruction, such as is intrinsic in a loving parent/child relationship, allows the community to learn from it and be prepared and strengthened for what is ahead. In the Gospel the Jewish people had always considered themselves to be the Chosen People, so they were in a privileged relationship with God. This story that Jesus told in response to the question about entry to the kingdom of God would have shattered their confidence. Jesus is warning that it is not enough to have shared a meal and heard the word, they must make a response to that word and act on it. To enter by the narrow door requires some effort, and just belonging to the chosen people is not enough to ensure salvation. Luke writes this Gospel to a mostly Gentile community, those who have been gathered for a place at the feast. The teaching assures them of the universality of God's love, and that redemption is open to all who respond positively.

## Reflection for Leaders

We must encourage each other in our common efforts to be faithful to the responsibility to share the good news. The Gospel today gives us a picture of being 'insiders' and 'outsiders'. Think about an experience you have had when you felt like an 'outsider'. Who are the people in our society who are treated as 'outsiders'? Is there anything that you personally can do for them? Jesus talks about going in by the narrow door, and we recognise that this is difficult and takes

some effort. Have there been times when you have avoided the narrow door? Is there a narrow door in your life at the moment that you would rather go around than through? Do you make the most of the opportunities you have to enhance the relationship you have with God through your prayer, service and the way you live your life? Think about those people around you who are the last to receive your attention or support. Try to make them first this week.



## Reflecting on the Readings with the children

Before Sunday read over the suggested discussion points given in the Leader's Liturgy Outline. With the 8-12 year olds: First, listen to the children's own responses to the Reading/s and then, if needed, use some of the discussion starters suggested.

With the 5-7 year olds: Adapt some of the questions in the 8-12 material and then join with the older group for the 'Liturgical Action'.

# LEADER'S LITURGY OUTLINE Twenty first Sunday in Ordinary Time, Yr C

At a suitable moment after the Opening Rites, but before the First Reading is proclaimed, the children are presented with the Children's Lectionary and a candle and sent, with their ministers, to the place where they will celebrate their own Liturgy of the Word, with words of dismissal such as the following:

INVITATION - Powhiri I invite the children to join in the procession for

their celebration of the Liturgy of the Word.

To the Minister of the Word: Receive this Book of Readings and proclaim God's Word

faithfully to the children entrusted to your care.

Receive this candle as the light of Christ who is present in

his Word.

PROCESSION WITH THE BOOK OF READINGS – Te Kapa o te Pukapuka Tapu

WELCOME - Ko te whakatau

Leader: God of love and forgiveness, you have called us to be your children. Help us to live in your way and be always ready to greet you.

R Amen.

First Reading: Hebrews 12:5a. 6-7, 11

(if used) The Word of the Lord / Ko te Kupu a te Ariki

Thanks be to God / Whakamoemiti ki te Atua

**Psalm 119** Response: O Lord, great peace have they who love your law

or Alleluia



### Gospel: Luke 13:22-30

Minister of the Word: A reading from the Holy Gospel according to Luke Children: Glory to you, O Lord / Korōria ki ā koe, e te Ariki

At the end of the Gospel: The Gospel of the Lord

Children: Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ / Kia whakanuia rā koe, e te Ariki, e Hēhu Karaiti.

# REFLECTING ON THE READINGS WITH THE CHILDREN – Whai Whakaaro

#### 8-12 year olds:

Suggested Beginning: A good place to begin is with the question: What did you hear? Allow each child the opportunity to respond in their own words to hearing the Word of God. Then begin a general discussion, building on these responses, perhaps using some prepared.

- Have you ever missed out on something special because you were too slow? What did that teach you? (Don't miss your chances and opportunities)
- Lots of people asked Jesus questions while he was travelling. Often he answered them by telling stories that made people think really hard.
- Who can belong to God's kingdom? (we are all invited to be God's children. God doesn't exclude anyone whatever their colour or language or standing in society)
- Are you glad that everyone can belong to God's kingdom?
- What is Jesus saying to us with this story? (don't miss your chance, it takes some effort)
- How do we have to live? (We must try to live in a way that is pleasing to God. We have to stay in relationship with God, and to work on keeping that relationship healthy even when we make mistakes)
- What does Jesus mean when he says that the ones who are now least important will be the most important?



**5-7 year olds**: Adapt some of the questions in the 8-12 material and then join with the older group for the 'Liturgical Action'

### LITURGICAL ACTION - Ko te Ritenga Karakia



Ask the children to think of someone they think is 'least' and pray for them. Pray for all people who try to live God's way.

### PROFESSION OF FAITH - Panui o te Whakapono

We believe in God the Father,
who made the whole world.

We believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God,
who was born in Bethlehem
and lived among us,

### PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL - Te Īnoīnga o te Hunga Whakapono

(Here are some suggested intercessions; you are encouraged to compose your own according to the age and experience of the children)

**Leader:** We have listened to the Gospel and come in faith to our God with our prayers and our needs:

- That the leaders of our Church understand and imitate God's faithful love for all people ... Let us pray to the Lord
  - R Lord hear our prayer or E te Ariki whakarongo mai rā ki a mātou
- That we develop a deep sense of being God's children and being obedient ... ... Let us pray to the Lord
  - R Lord hear our prayer or E te Ariki whakarongo mai rā ki a mātou
- For a greater awareness that God's ways are not our ways, that the first will be last and the last, first ... Let us pray to the Lord
  - R Lord hear our prayer or E te Ariki whakarongo mai rā ki a mātou
- For great peace amongst all who love God and God's law ... Let us pray to the Lord R Lord hear our prayer or E te Ariki whakarongo mai rā ki a mātou

**Leader:** God of love and compassion, look kindly on those for whom we pray and grant us

what we ask you in faith. We ask this through Our Lord Jesus Christ

All: Amen

The children re-join the assembly before the prayers over the gifts.
