# Leader's Preparation

In preparation for leading this celebration begin by reading and reflecting on the Scriptures for the

Twenty-Ninth Sunday in Ordinary Time, World Mission Sunday, starting with the Gospel. (You may choose to use or focus on one reading only, but remember that the Gospel may not be omitted.) Then look through the preparatory material that follows and familiarise yourself with the Liturgy Outline.

GOSPEL Matthew 22:15-21

The Pharisees got together and planned how they could trick Jesus into saying something wrong. They sent some of their followers and some of Herod's followers to say to him, "Teacher, we know that you are honest. You teach the truth about what God wants people to do. And you treat everyone with the same respect, no matter who they are.

Tell us what you think!

Should we pay taxes to the Emperor or not?"

Jesus knew their evil thoughts and said, "Why are you trying to test me? You show-offs! Let me see one of the coins used for paying taxes."

They brought him a silver coin, and he asked, "Whose picture and name are on it?"

"The Emperor's, "They answered

Then Jesus told them,

"Give the Emperor what belongs to him and give God what belongs to God."

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The LORD said to Cyrus, his chosen one, "I have taken hold of your right hand to help conquer nations and remove kings from power. City gates will open for you. Not one will stay closed. "Cyrus, you don't even know me! But I have called you by name and highly honoured you, because of Jacob, my servant, and Israel, my chosen one. Only I am the LORD! "There is no other God. I have made you strong, though you don't know me. Now everyone from east to west will know that I am the LORD. No other gods are real."

#### Response: Give the Lord glory and honour

Sing a new song to the LORD! Everyone on this earth, sing praises to the LORD. Tell every nation on earth, "The LORD is wonderful and does marvellous things!"

"The LORD is great and deserves our greatest praise! He is the only God worthy of our worship. Other nations worship idols, but the LORD created the heavens.

"Everyone on earth, now tremble and worship the LORD, majestic and holy. "Announce to the nations, "The LORD is King! God will judge the people with fairness."

#### SECOND READING

1 Thessalonians 1:1-5

From Paul, Silas, and Timothy.

To the church in Thessalonica: the people of God the Father and of the Lord Jesus Christ. I pray that God will be kind to you and will bless you with peace! We thank God for you and always mention you in our prayers. Each time we pray we tell God our Father about your faith and loving work and about your firm hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. My dear friends, God loves you, and we know he has chosen you to be his people. When we told you the good news, it was with the power and assurance that come from the Holy Spirit, and not simply with words.

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## Background to the Readings for Leaders

Isaiah was among the exiles during the captivity in Babylon. He never lost hope of his country's restoration, and sees Cyrus the Persian as his people's liberator when he overran Babylon in 538BC. Thessalonica, capital of Macedonia, was an important centre of trade. This letter was probably the first book of the New Testament to be written. Its purpose was to allay misplaced fears for those who had died before the second coming. This excerpt shows Paul's great affection for his converts, Affection was not featured in the Gospel. The Pharisees, strict legalists, were devious in their plan to trap Jesus. Given the political and religious situation of the time, the question posed by the Pharisees offered a no-win scenario. The people had to pay

taxes to the Roman Emperor as well as a temple tax. Had Jesus answered 'yes', he could have been accused of betraying his own religious duty. A 'no' would be treason – inciting others to not pay taxes was sedition. Jesus' answer makes clear that there are obligations to the government for any citizen, but there are also obligations to God. Whereas the coin bears the image of the Emperor and so belongs to him, the whole of creation displays the imprint of God. Civil authority must be recognised but the first loyalty of all creation is to God.

#### Reflection for Leaders

As you reflect on the readings today, think about the obligations that you have towards God and towards the State. We live in an increasingly secular society, where faith in God is often viewed as irrelevant and unnecessary. For many of us, there are increasing difficulties in living lives which balances our obligations to God and to society. Can you think of ways that you might be able to improve the integration of these aspects of your life? What are the things that belong to God? How easy do you find it giving back to God what belongs to God? In what ways do you do this? Can you identify trends in the world today that might benefit from having Gospel values applied to them? How might you actively promote some of these values? During the coming week, consider carefully the response that Jesus would have towards issues that come up with regard to political, economic or current events in your neighbourhood. As this Sunday is **World Mission Sunday** and the Liturgical Action this week focuses on Mission. #### Reflecting on the Readings with the children

Before Sunday read over the suggested discussion points given in the Leader's Liturgy Outline. With the 8-12 year olds: First, listen to the children's own responses to the Reading/s and then, if needed, use some of the discussion starters suggested.

With the 5-7 year olds: Adapt some of the questions in the 8-12 material and then join with the older group for the 'Liturgical Action'.

### Suggested Focus

Prepare a focus for the area where the children's Liturgy of the Word is to be held: Green cloth, Lectionary, a candle, some coins in a purse.

At a suitable moment after the Opening Rites, but before the First Reading is proclaimed, the children are presented with the Children's Lectionary and a candle and sent, with their ministers, to the place where they will celebrate their own Liturgy of the Word, with words of dismissal such as the following:

INVITATION- Powhiri I invite the children to join in the procession for

their celebration of the Liturgy of the Word.

To the Minister of the Word: Receive this Book of Readings and proclaim God's Word

faithfully to the children entrusted to your care.

Receive this candle as the light of Christ who is present in

his Word.



# REFLECTING ON THE READINGS WITH THE CHILDREN – Whai Whakaaro

**8-12 year olds:** Suggested Beginning: A good place to begin is with the question: What did you hear? Allow each child the opportunity to respond in their own words to hearing the Word of God. Then begin a general discussion, building on these responses, perhaps using some prepared questions, like the following, to stimulate ideas.

- Jesus was very clever. He was able to turn the question back on the Pharisees. He reminded them that God is greater than Caesar. The whole world and everything in it belong to God. What belongs to God? Examples are trees, air, the seas, the land, animals, people yes, even Caesar!
- We are made in the image and likeness of God; we are his children and we all belong to God. He is our Father and we are precious to him.
- What does it mean to be made in the image and likeness of God? We know something of what God is like because of Jesus. Jesus was the Son of God. He showed us how to be prayerful, patient, kind, giving and loving. Encourage the children to provide examples of how we can be like Jesus. When we act in the way Jesus did and when we follow his words to love our neighbours and even people who are mean to us we are reminding others of what God is like, of God's great love.

<u>5-7 year olds</u>: Adapt some of the questions in the 8-12 material and then join with the older group for the 'Liturgical Action'

#### LITURGICAL ACTION - Ko te Ritenga Karakia

Sadly, there are children around the world who do not know that they are made in the image and likeness of God. No one has told them that they are precious and that God is their loving Father. There are even some places where there are no hospitals or schools.

Today is World Mission Sunday. It is the day when Catholics around the world celebrate the fact that everyone belongs to God. We pray for each other and we pray for those children around the world who do not have things like schools or hospitals and children who have little or no food and go hungry. We pray for those missionaries all over the world who are sharing God's love with those children, bringing the good news of Jesus to them to try and help them out of their troubles. By being like Jesus these missionaries show what God's love is like. And we are all Missionaries of God's love. By sharing and praying for children less fortunate than us we can show them what God is like.

#### We are all Missionaries of God's love and we belong to him!
